# TRADITIONAL OWNER EMPLOYMENT

ueensland's Natural ResourceManagement (NRM)
Regional Bodies are committed to working with
Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NRM
Regional Bodies provide employment for over 320 people
across Queensland, many of them from rural and remote
areas. Of these, nearly three percent identify as Aboriginal
or Torres Strait Islander.

NRM Regional bodies also employ First Nations individuals and organisations as community delivery partners. 2018 -19 saw over 350 Indigenous peoples employed to deliver projects, more than the number of direct employees within the sector itself. NRM Regional Bodies also focus on engagement, consultation and recognising the value of Traditional Ecological Knowledge when working on Country.







## BURNETT MARY REGIONAL GROUP AND THE GIDARJIL LAND AND SEA RANGERS

Gidarjil Land and Sea
Rangers represent the
Gurang and Gooreng
Gooreng peoples. The
Rangers play an integral role
in the Burnett Mary Regional
Group - facilitated Nest To
Ocean Program which seeks
to protect endangered and
vulnerable marine turtles
from localised extinction.
In the 2019 - 20 turtle
nesting season, Rangers

monitored beaches around Agnes Water, Wreck Rock, Rules Beach, Norval Park, Moore Park Beach, Barubbra Island and Mon Repos Beach. Ranger data has been used as part of the Queensland Turtle Conservation Program which seeks to betterinform conservation efforts for endangered loggerhead turtles and vulnerable green and flatback turtles.

### **SEEDS OF CHANGE**

Almost 80 Cape York
Indigenous participants
have been busy working on
the Cape York Community
Seed Collection Program.
The program was
established in April 2018,
attracting pickers from the
Cape York communities of
Cooktown, Hope Vale and
Laura.

Cape York Natural Resource Management initiated the program to supply local seed for gully remediation and other environmental regeneration works, including the newly established Amrun mine in Weipa. Funding from the Australian Government's Reef Trust Investment was instrumental in establishing the project which became self-sustaining once trading with the Amrun mine began.
